Activities

**Have each student make a Christmas card for someone they love. Encourage them to write specific examples of why they love that person.

**Many stories are told of the transformation that can occur when a downtrodden person is shown love and kindness. Assign a secret pal to each student in the class. Encourage them to do nice things for that person during the "Twelve Days of Christmas." Students may reveal who their secret pals were or leave their identity anonymous teaching the lesson that acts of love don't have to be known to everyone. **Act out Dickens' A Christmas Carol. Have students discuss with their parents the importance of benevolence and charitable giving in the world and workplace.

**Experiment with magnetism by putting varying layers of different materials (foil, cotton, felt, paper, plastic) between two magnets. Which materials and how many layers affect the attraction of the two magnets? A story is told of two friends walking in a desert. During an argument one friend slapped the second. The second friend said nothing put knelt and wrote in the sand, "This day my friend slapped me." The two went farther, found an oasis, and started to swim. The second friend started to drown. With a great effort, the first rescued him. Now the second friend found a large rock and chiseled, "Today my friend saved my life." Later the first friend asked why he had written the first message in the sand and the second on a rock. His friend replied, "When a friend hurts us, we should write it down in the sand where the winds of forgiveness can erase it away. When something great happens, we should

Edith Cavell was born on December 4, 1865 in Norfolk. When she was 20 years old, she entered the nursing profession. In 1907, she was appointed the matron of Berkendael Medical Institute in Brussels. Here she was a teacher and administrator.

During World War I and Germany's occupation of Belgium, the Institute was converted into a

Red Cross hospital for all nationalities. Whether they were German, English or Belgian, Edith nursed her patients with dedication and care. She continued to supervise other nurses, deliver lectures, and maintain official records, but she also joined a group that helped wounded Allied soldiers recuperate and escape. To avoid questions and incrimination of her nurses, often she alone nursed, cooked for, provided papers, money and guides to these fleeing soldiers.

On August 5, 1915 Edith was arrested by local German authorities and charged with having personally aided 200 soldiers in escape. She was sentenced to death. Within days after her execution, she became known as a martyr. Sentiment ran high against her executioners, and for weeks afterward Allied recruitment doubled.8

A statue of Edith Cavell in her nurse's cloak stands in St. Martin's Place, just off London's Trafalgar Square. As tribute to her life, it displays the words, "Humanity, Fortitude, Devotion, Sacrifice." The statue also bears her statement: "Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness for anyone."9

Writing or Discussion Topics

**The Gift of the Magi by O. Henry is a Christmas story of true love. In this story a husband wants to buy a beautiful set of combs for his wife's long hair but doesn't have enough money. He decides to sell his precious watch in order to obtain the money to buy the combs. The wife wants to buy a chain for the husband's watch and earns money for it by cutting off and selling her hair. When they show each other their gifts their love is strengthened even though the gifts cannot be used. Discuss the thought and sacrifice that goes into a gift of love. Write about what you would sell in order to have enough money to buy a special gift for someone. Who would that someone be?

Baird comments, "May no gift be too small to give, nor too simple to receive, which is wrapped in thoughtfulness, and tied with love." ¹⁰ Sometimes the best gift is a gift that doesn't cost anything. Discuss what kind of gift could be given to show love that doesn't cost money.


